This October, marks Italian-American Heritage Month by recognizing the contributions and achievements of Italian Americans. Over 26 million Americans of Italian descent currently reside in the U.S.—making up America's seventh largest ethnic group. The italian American heritage month is in October to coincide with Columbus Day—the national holiday celebrated on the second Monday of the month. Italian-American Heritage Month celebrates the distinguished cultural contributions of American with Italian lineage.

I AM AN ITALIAN AMERICAN

The Columbian Quandary



As Italian Americans, and many other persons who appreciate Italian culture and history, we have taken great pride in the "discovery" of the American continents by Christopher Columbus. He was an ambitious and capable Genovese sailor working for the reigning Spanish monarchs at that time, Ferdinand and Isabella. For many years the facts, though readily available in

scholarly circles, were not known or ignored by the general public. Instead, his accomplishments were romanticized and the many negative circumstances that came about after that "first contact" with the native populations were downplayed and even hidden. All to maintain the emphasis on the fact that his perseverance led to the colonization and eventual domination of the Americas by European nations.

Columbus was a man of his times; he was intelligent but also ambitious; a good Catholic in certain ways, who named the Caribbean islands that he visited with the names of saints or feast days; but he was seeking gold and luxuries that would pay for the expenses of the trips! At first friendly with the native people when he first met them, he became harsh with them when he found little profit available to take back to Spain. He was a confident and intelligent man, but he was also flawed. However, because he had courage and a brilliant sense of navigation he opened these American continents to the European Age of Discovery.

So, we can continue to admire him for the courageousness of the journeys he led, and accept with regret that he was not a saint. I suggest that you consider reading the book, *Columbus: The Four Voyages, 1492-1504,* by Laurence Berggren, that our Book Club will read for its October selection. The information is in the newsletter and we invite you to join us. The book was recently published and has more accurate information about the man, his circumstances and the turbulent times he lived.


Guy Tedesco artist, Sculptor. Designer





ITALIAN HERITAGE SOCIETY OF INDIANA NOMINATIONS

Nominations for board members and officers for the 2019 Italian Heritage Society of Indiana board of directors may now be made through and including 11:45 P.M. of November 1, 2019.

A nominee must be a current-active member of the organization in good standing, i.e., dues have been paid within the past calendar year.

Either self-nomination or nomination of another with the prior consent of the person being nominated, must be made in writing via email to the nominations committee through our website, see below. Please include the nominees' names and contact information (address, telephone numbers & e-mail addresses) along with the reason(s) you believe these persons should be nominated.

The nominating committee, appointed by Chairperson James Divita, will then review the nominations and make a final selection for a slate to be submitted to the current board.

The board must consist of no less than 9 but no more than 15 members and officers for president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. All positions serve a one (1) year term. Officers may only serve 3 consecutive terms while there are no term limits on board members. At this time the current President, Vice President and Secretary will not be running for re-election for the position they now hold as they have reached their three (3) year term limit.

If no more than the required number to serve on the board have been selected by the committee after nominations are made, a ballot vote will not be necessary. Only in the event that the number of nominees selected exceeds the number required under the bylaws will a ballot vote by the general membership be required. In that event, ballots will be sent to current members by e-mail.

30th Annual POW Chapel in the Meadow

Sunday, September 8, 2019 about 45 people gathered for the thirtieth yearly outdoor mass at the tiny Madonna del Prato chapel at Camp Atterbury.

Italian POW's captured in Northern Africa in World War II built the chapel in 1943 from materials begged from the internment camp at the time. The chapel now remains as the only building left standing of the facility which once housed 15,000 POW's.

Father Chris Wadleton, pastor of Saint Bartholomew Parish in Columbus, Indiana celebrated the mass accompanied by a choir formed from parishioners of Little Flower Parish and Father Wadleton former pastorate, St. Philip Neri Parish both in Indianapolis.

The Italian Heritage Society of Indiana has sponsored the event since its inception, this year with the necessary and vital assistance of Camp Atterbury Muscatatuck under Captain Jesse Bien, Camp Atterbury Public Information Officer and the Camp Atterbury Veteran Memorial Association (CAVMA).

This year the event was held in conjunction with a Camp Atterbury Museum open house and a pitch in lunch at the Camp Atterbury Welcome Center.

Attendees included four sons of former POW internee Giovanni Tedesco.

Staples of delicious pasta and meatballs once again came to the luncheon courtesy of Matthew Iaria.

The Vendemmia: An Italian Autumn Ritual





The arrival of autumn is filled with meaning in many cultures; in Italy it is associated largely with the "Vendemmia"—the grape harvest—that will go to make that year's wine. The vendemmia is much more than a mere agricultural event: entire villages dedicate their whole energies to it, and life revolves around the grapes. The pickers are old farmers, young students trying to make a buck, tourists who wish to share the experience, and relatives of the landowners.

The work is fairly hard (and very sticky!), and long days under the Mediterranean late summer sun take a toll on your energies, but when nighttime falls the workers collect around campfires to chat, tell their stories, finish up the previous year's wine and have a jolly time before heading to bed where they will enjoy a good night's sleep.

The rites of vendemmia have something ancestral about them. In Italy, people have been cultivating vines for the past three millennia, and collecting the grapes has always been the same work. It can't be done with machines, so the workers today do exactly what the inhabitants of the Greek colonies in southern Italy did when Rome was still a small provincial town in Italy, centuries before turning into the greatest empire in human history. Back then the wine was much stronger (it was unthinkable to drink diluted wine: according to Homer, pure wine was the drink that helped Ulysses to get even the Cyclopes Polyphemus to sleep, allowing him to escape with his men, but the vendemmia is still the same.

So if you are planning a trip to Italy, this might well be the perfect time, as you'll enjoy the countryside immersed in its lovelies activity of the year.




